PODS EYE VIEW ON HOSTING THREE INDOOR EVENTS

We the PODS are lucky, we have a good hard working team of people who pull together to make our Flyball successful. We do not have a sponsor (not for lack of trying) to help out financially and like most teams have to support ourselves, so any profits from Demonstrations and Shows goes back into the PODS fund, for buying and replacing equipment and hopefully one day our own set of lights. Our own teams always pay the full cost of racing at our own events and turn their hand in different ways to help with the funds e.g. Tony has become a carpenter, to replace the many slats that get broken during racing, Hilery makes Stop Pads to sell and in March, Debbie ran a Tombola, all contributions coming from the PODS members.

To find a convenient venue in winter is difficult. Handlers need to be able to get a hot drink, they need loo's, be able to chat away from the Flyball racing, to park near the action, room to exercise their dogs and to feel as secure as possible. We ran an event at Ryton-on-Dunsmore, a wonderful place with lots of room, but the venue alone cost £750 per day. We had to buy more rubber at £60 plus a roll, the rosettes were £160 and then there are items like the rolls of gaffer tape, the paper for schedules, stamps etc. etc. The total cost was £1,150.

At Market Harborough we had 105 feet to race on, just enough, and it has all the above facilities, the cost £350 per day, so we could break even by charging £35 per team. We would very much like to use Ryton again, but it's a risk financially, we would need to charge £45 per team and have a minimum of 25 teams competing.

The PODS would really appreciate some feed back from everyone!! How much are you prepared to pay for longer indoor racing lanes?? We are fully aware that with the cost of travelling on top of the racing fee and the fact that other teams are trying to get more equipment has to be considered. The sport is growing and the need for more sets of lights spread around the country is becoming important. PLEASE give us your opinions to help us make a decision for next winter - the halls have to be booked well in advance.

In any event we had some good, exciting, enjoyable racing at Market Harborough during January, February and March. Each Show brought it's own problems, mainly due to the fact that we had late arrivals at each event (not surprising really when you think of the mileage covered by some teams), one team got totally lost and went on to the wrong motorway and it didn't help losing an hours sleep at the March event (bad planning on our part). This of course meant re-scheduling some races and we would like to give a big thankyou to all the teams for their help, co-operation and patience.

Our thanks of course to all the Judges, who carried out their duties in the usual professional manner, the pressure of getting the races completed is always a problem when you have to vacate the premises by a particular time. Our thanks also to the Tornadoes for the use of their lights and Packington for the loan of their rubber and Doreen's carpet. Without everyone helping and working together it would be impossible to run a show.

The one thing we did not expect but had at all three Shows, was good weather - surprise, surprise! **THANKS AGAIN EVERYONE.**

BONNIES FAREWELL

My mum and I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone in Flyball who helped us during the year from May 1998 to May 1999. I ran in my first competition at Knebworth in May '98 (boy was my mum scared)!! Everyone was really nice and helpful when I went wrong on my first few runs especially Lorraine who's always taken an interest in what I've done. I ran my first three competitions for the PODlets and then progressed to the PODS where I ran mostly as last dog through a very busy Flyball year.

After being part of the winning Flyball Team at Crufts in '99, like a lot of the other dogs, I caught Kennel Cough and was out of action for a while. After that we went on a lovely walk round this big watery place that mum called a reservoir, it was a great walk but unfortunately the path was very rough and I cut my front paws badly and was out of action for five weeks. Just after this we moved to a new house with a big garden, on one of the first few days after we moved I was playing in the garden (with something I'd stolen out of one of the boxes!) I jumped in the air and landed badly and pulled a muscle in my right shoulder, after four weeks rest and treatment from the vet I was allowed to play again but the muscle went again. This time mum took me to see a chiropractor who did some very strange things to me and said the muscle had a small tear in it. I had to go for walks on the lead for weeks!! (Boring), but by the end of August she said I could do a little bit of Flyball at Stoneleigh. I was only allowed to take part in a few demonstration runs on Saturday and Monday and everyone was pleased that I seemed O.K. at the end of it.

After a few days at home I started to have bad pains in my shoulders and couldn't walk properly on my front right leg and then both my front legs hurt. The vet sent me to an Orthopaedic specialist who did lots of tests and said I had Tendonitis in both my shoulders. So it was back to walking on a lead and no playing and jumping! After about ten days my right back leg started to hurt and I had to go back to the specialist again, he did lots more tests and discovered that I have Hip Dysplasia, my left hip is not too bad but my right hip is worse and it has Arthritis in it.

I've been doing a lot of swimming and water treading to build up my muscles again and I've had several sessions of Acupuncture and that has helped with the pain in my shoulders but as I'm always going to have a problem with them I can no longer do Flyball.

So this is to say that sadly, I have now officially retired from B.F.A. Flyball. I would have liked to have gained enough points to be an Advanced Flyball Dog but I have really enjoyed my one year of competition and winning at Crufts in '99 was a great way to end a Flyball career.

Thank you to everyone who has helped make the sport so great, Mum says thanks for the sympathy and support from all those who know us, especially Lorraine and Chris and friends in the PODS, I shall still be around at competitions and soon there should be a new addition to the family and I can pass on a few tips!!

Sadly, Misty experienced her last fit on 17^{th} January (just 18 days after her 9^{th} birthday) we knew then we couldn't watch her suffer anymore. Those final moments with Misty will be with us forever.

I know everyone misses their pets when they go, and despite the fact that Liz tries to keep her feelings close to her heart, she misses her more than she lets on, as do Jess, Sheena, Blue, Ben & Daisy Bell.

I would like to say a huge thank you to all our family and friends who supported us through our loss. Misty may be gone, but she will never be forgotten. Rest in peace 'Mizzy Moo' you were our pet first and foremost, a competing girl second.

DIARY OF A LUMP

August 16th took the dogs swimming - well Grace swam, Tigger, Pia & Midge just paddled! Later, brushing Tigger's leg I felt a lump. Was very surprised because it wasn't there in the morning after their swim.

August 17th Took Tigger to the vet to get the lump examined. She took a sample. pm The vet phoned ... there were Cancer Cells. She would send the sample away to find out if we could leave the lump until after the Stoneleigh Tournament.

August 18th I phone the vets - I'm told the results aren't back, try to convince myself no news is good news. Failed miserably!!

August 19th Vet rings, the results had arrived yesterday but the nurse hadn't found them. They were inconclusive, definitely Cancer, but because of the speed of the growth the labority recommended that it came off as soon as possible. Tigger booked in for surgery the following morning. As Tigger would be "nil by mouth" after 9pm, the dogs were fed early. They thought it was great, until 11.30pm that is. This is their normal feeding time and having eaten three hours earlier, had forgotten!!

August 20th The day had arrived and Tigger went to the vets. I hated leaving him and found it hard to concentrate at work.

pm Went to collect him and burst out laughing when I saw him with a bright pink bandage on his leg. Pink on a boy! Whatever next!

The lump had been sent off to find out exactly what it was and if it had spread. Results back in about a week. Tigger had chicken for tea, so the others had chicken too. So did the cats - the only way to stop them mugging the dogs!

August 21st Back to the vets, the bandage had slipped. A smaller one put on. *pm* Had to take the bandage off; his foot had started to swell. Later, I had to put the bandage back on, but looser, he'd started to lick the stitches.

August 22nd Off to the Chemist to buy Micropore & Melolin dressings, have to change the dressing twice a day.

August 23^{rd} Back to the vet for a check up, all fine and they gave me some blue bandage.

August 26th Vet rings with results from the lab. There's good news and bad news! The good news, It was a type of Cancer that has a low malignancy and doesn't normally spread. The bad news, Tigger's lump was showing a higher malignancy than it should, and they'd found Cancer Cells in the surrounding tissue!

He could have restricted lead exercise as he was going 'stir crazy', I was running out of ideas to keep him busy. We ended up playing 'dinosaur tug' for hours on end. It kept him happy and didn't put any stress on his front legs.

August 29th Left home very early with Grace, Pia and Midge to go to the PODS Tournament. I felt awful leaving Tigs at home, it was the first event I'd ever been to without him, missed him terribly all day. I was very touched by the number of people who came and asked how Tigger was.

September 15th Tiggers stitches came out. His leg looks like it should be on a poodle (no offence to poodles). When we got home he chased Grace round the garden for ten minutes. The Vet said that Tigger was very lucky, because I had the lump examined as soon as I had spotted it and it had been dealt with so quickly, she felt the chances of it recurring were probably slight. So the moral of this story is simple - If you find a lump, don't wait, get it looked at straight away.

Tigger is fine and was back in training the weekend after the stitches came out. So far no more lumps have appeared and long may it remain so.

I know just how lucky I am that I still have Pia and Tigger, and my heart goes out to those who haven't been so lucky.

STEPH RENDALL

Just a short note to all teams about the Box Loader, that lonely figure who stands at the other end of the lane. You know, the area where the box is (that's the black fronted thing the ball comes out of). Now, you probably wouldn't recognise them if you passed them in the street, so if I say it's the person you shout at when there's no ball loaded or it's in the wrong hole, you should know who I'm talking about.

Now that spring is here, I've a few suggestions to try out when you're practising, to help you retain this most valuable member of your team, unless of course you have perfected the self-loading, self-shouting box.
