

# Back to the future: 1994 - 2004

It's January 16<sup>th</sup> 2004, a cold, blustery day when the thought of doing Flyball is, frankly, not very inviting. But, on this very day, ten years ago, a group of about 50 intrepid Flyball enthusiasts met at Ryish Green Sports Centre, Lower Earley, Berks., for the inaugural meeting of the British Flyball Association.

Of course, Flyball didn't just start on that day. 1990 saw Crufts being held at Earls Court for the last time and included a demonstration of Flyball, a sport that started in America as a spin-off from Agility. Despite 'some handlers having to run up to the box with their dogs', Peter Roberts, our present Chairperson, was so interested that he wrote off to America for a book about Flyball. Other like minded people were also enthusiastic about this new sport and got together to form the Flyball Enthusiasts Group.

In those days, the boxes carried around were 'own design' with, as you can imagine, some pretty weird and wonderful ideas. There were no 'Crufts' boxes so it was a case of one box fits all competitions. Some were pretty much the forerunner of the boxes that most of us still use today. Peter's was like a present box, but extended upwards a further 24 inches and with a loading lever on top! It was so heavy that it had wheels on it. The Thames Tigers box used an electronic solenoid from a car starter motor (very high tech!), but of course it needed a car battery as well.


Two competitions were run each with 4 events, the 'Chum' series that led to Crufts, and a 'Bonus' series. In 1992, Spillers involvement led to Flyball being included in Superdogs for the Winalot Challenge, a multi discipline event for seven television programmes. (As Peter put it) a not very serious event; distances from the start line to the first jump and from jump four to the box were altered, making changeovers for the humans a bit of a problem. Peter tells me that he had the honour of judging the first Flyball event in the UK to use electronic timing, with a link from a simple set of countdown start lights. The countdown lights from this early set has continued to be used by PODS just for demonstrations and is now looked after by Molten Magnets.

In 1993, when the sport had been going for over two years an article appeared in 'Wild about Animals' magazine with the headline 'FLYBALL' the latest team sport for dogs. I felt it was worth including some quotes:

'Some say team captains try to psych-out doggie athletes on other teams by allowing a dog on their own team to cause a false start, thus making the opposing canine contestant nervous.' (Ron has, of course, perfected this ploy by exhausting the opposing dog with false starts in nearly every run. This is particularly effective when it's boiling hot!).

"in Flyball, the canines do all the running, and do not involve owners..." (I hear howls of protest from all quarters – how come we all walk/stagger out of the ring puffing and panting then?) However, in the early days, the changeovers were static, and on the line – no wonder the times were so slow!

The Kennel Club general committee came up with a 'brilliant' idea that the ball must be seen to 'fly', with, as you can imagine, all sorts of interpretations of what was meant by 'flying'. Officials visited the Crufts qualifiers to check that the ball did indeed 'fly'. The result of this was that teams were qualifying then were being disqualified for having a box that didn't cause the ball to 'fly'. Thus was the Crufts box born, and some teams decided that they would now have no more to do with Crufts leading the Flyball Enthusiasts Group to feel that 'it was time to make a more formal arrangement.'



The meeting opened with Kevin McNicholas giving a resume of the aims of the Flyball Enthusiasts Group - which was set up to run Flyball events. This group now wanted to set up the British Flyball Association, and today wanted to get a committee of 7 people from which the officers of the Association would be appointed. Roy McNeil was suggested as Chairman and agreed by the meeting.

There followed a Treasurer's Report that pointed out many expenses were shouldered by individuals, leaving the Group with a small balance of just under £300.

Roy then gave a review of Flyball held under international Rules. He expressed disappointment that Tony Veal and Spillers had not carried on with the improvement of the sport. Indoor League and the summer shows had been good at promoting Flyball and it had progressed rapidly due to support from all teams. There was a good calendar of events for 1994.

I was amazed to find the Flyball Record was already in existence and that the Americans were impressed by it and would like to have a similar one! Anton Witter pointed out that the Record was not the magazine of the Group, but was intended for all people who compete in Flyball. Articles and news items were needed for the magazine. Does this sound familiar? A recent article had been about a demonstration at the Grosvenor Hotel for 600 handicapped children – that must have been mind blowing.

After some discussion about publishing the International Rules, it was suggested that the committee should draw up a standard set of rules to cover every event.

Kevin talked about his visit to Canada and their running of Flyball – pretty much as we were doing except all competitions were indoors and entry fees were £30 - £50 per team per class.

Fees and Subscriptions were next on the agenda tied in with items needed by the BFA. Guess what! Yes electronic timing and lights were the most costly items. However, subscriptions were set at £12, haven't we done well in our 10 years?

Finally the committee was elected: Roy McNeil (Power Paws); Peter Roberts (PODS); Kevin McNicholas (Tornadoes); Christine Dunning (Wasps) Penny Coulter-Smith (Vikings); Anton Witter (Wellow) and Ken Hickman (?). It was suggested that committee members should consider serving for two years, but with only half retiring each year; also that the treasurer and secretary should retire in alternate years.

Quite often I have run my dog in Starter Classes to be there to help new team members and so have no points at all for those runs, but still worked hard during the day.

It does take a lot of runs at 5 points a run to become a Flyball Dog and I wonder whether it should be that each Division should have awards that are in keeping with the points:- i.e. a Division One dog would need 500 or 1000 points (for example) to get a Flyball Dog Award – meaning that it had done a certain number of runs/races in keeping with the other Divisions. As it is a dog can become a Flyball Dog in one or two competitions if it is running in the top divisions. As my little dog came into the sport quite late I don't think that she will be around to get 1000 points, but keep up the good work Rachel.

We were going to flyball practice and I was in my cage, in the back of the car with the other two dogs and a flyball box. Geoff was in a hurry and as we drove into the Sutton Fields training centre he careered round the corner tipping me in my kennel on my side. It really was a shock and has now made me very nervous of getting in the car. Anne has been encouraging me so I will jump in again now but once in I hide my head at the back and keep my eyes shut until we are well underway. I am OK once we get going and when we get to our destination – especially flyball – I soon forget my worries.

Now, having watched other dogs antics at flyball since I was two months old I have at last been able to join in. In October at the end of the normal training classes my Mum, who trains Live Wires, started a special puppy group, with 'baby' jumps and a 'dummy' box. Five other puppies were there and although I couldn't wait to do it myself I thought I was there to watch, as usual. Mum then said "come on Jennie it's your turn now" and my heart missed a beat. We did run backs to chase a ball and then from a short distance away were able to got to the box to get the ball to bring it back. I just loved all the chasing. At last I had a ball all to myself without my sisters pinching it off me. Anne had given me a short try once at home but this was the first time I had done flyball with other dogs on such a big field. I was 'hooked', like my sisters and each week since, have been standing up barking in unison with them long before we've even reached the training field. As I am almost eight months old I have joined the starters group. Although I am not allowed to do races until I am a year old I can get a full sized tennis ball from the real box and run over 8" hurdles, so it feels like the real thing.

Just when I thought things were improving I got another shock. I got up one morning to go on my normal walk when we sailed straight past the dog walk field and to this strange smelling place on a busy road. Why had we come here? Gyp and Jodie seemed to realise something was up because they stopped barking and lay down. Maybe they had been here before? I was the only dog to go inside with Anne and just like when I came into the world I was pleased to see everyone but they didn't want to be bothered with a dog who thought she should be able to jump over the reception desk. In fact Mum kept telling me off and bellowing 'No', so I felt quite embarrassed in front of all the other dogs and owners. Then a lady in a white coat took me on my lead into a kennel at the back. Everything smelt of antiseptic and I thought I must have been really naughty. Why did Anne drive away and leave me there on my own? Didn't she want me anymore?

Later I made a big fuss of the lady who came in my cage and made it difficult for her to push a needle in my leg. I'd seen and felt those needles before and it hurt so I wasn't going to give in easily. Eventually I had to submit and soon felt sleepy. Next thing I knew I was waking up feeling queezy and with a sore tum. 'Please Mum come and pick me up, I don't like this place'. I was so pleased to see Mum and Dad at teatime but struggled to wag my tail and tottered to the car. This time I didn't complain when I was lifted in. I felt ravenous as I'd eaten nothing since last night and was looking forward to curling up in my basket in front of the fire. Mum said I'd been spayed, whatever that means, but I'd be back to doing flyball again in about four weeks. That long! I soon wished I had never been to that evil smelling place. My head was throbbing and I didn't feel like doing much. I had a bit of dinner, a wee in the garden and then flopped in my basket and soon fell asleep. That night I slept in my cage next to Mum – so she really does love me after all.

Now I am annoyed with myself. If I try to move the stitches in my tum are really pinching and I can't stay in one place for long. Gypsy and Jodie ignore me and seem to know I am not allowed to play with them. I'm really upset that I am only able to go out for short walks on the lead whilst watching the other two race around on the field as normal. The good news though is that Mum says I am going to have my wound checked in a day or so and the stitches out altogether next week. Whoopee, can't wait 'till I can get my own back on Jodie and Gyp and particularly to be able to do flyball again. I'll be really good from now on Mum........



The stumbling quickly gathered speed and we were hooked. As starters, eased out of The Northern Bytes nest, we helped form the Flying Colours. Latterly we joined the Live Wires also with some success – we even took some legs off several teams of note (not literally you understand). Cracker is the third dog in eight months to 'go' from the Live Wires first team but in true flyball fashion others have filled their places. Yet nothing and no-one will ever be able to totally fill Cracker's place within me. There will always be a very special place, kept just for her.



#### LIVE WIRES TOURNAMENT FORMAT

I am writing to give some feedback on the new format that was tried at our tournament in September.

I do not consider myself 'brave' in attempting to change peoples way of thinking towards the future of flyball in the UK. I have not been competing in this 'sport' as long as others but I have had sufficient life experiences as well as successfully participating and organising many other sporting activities to realise that any club activity, society or whatever should always be looking towards improvement. As is always the case people are noticeably reluctant to change as they feel comfortable with the status quo. But it is not healthy for any activity to 'live in the past'. As the years go by and younger generations begin to participate they have a totally different lifestyle and outlook on life from previous generations. Their goals are not necessarily different but their more varied interests and commitments, with young families or older parents to look after mean that time spent on any activity has to be rationed.

On the other hand I don't believe that change for changes sake is a good idea either. People may ask why do we need to change what is tested, tried and working OK. But then what worked once for one generation of flyballers may not work for the next. In the UK flyball is THE fastest growing dog sport and therefore with increased media coverage we should expect over the next 5-10 years that many new clubs will be formed and BFA membership will greatly increase as a result. Are we actually ready to take this on board? New ideas need to be tried to keep future generations interested enough to move the sport ahead. In other words we cannot stand still and need to be prepared to look for ways to streamline and modernise tournament procedure.

My question is — who decided on the particular format in the first place? Alternatively did it just evolve because each team organising tournaments just copied everyone else for fear of upsetting the 'apple cart'? 10years ago when flyball clubs started competing in the UK there were fewer competing teams. Each tournament would have a lower entry than today. There would be fewer divisions with the result that waiting times between divisions were much less and the day would most likely be over much quicker. Today's flyball tournaments take up more time so it makes sense that if you are not racing until mid-morning, for example, who wouldn't jump at the chance to arrive a little later? Conversely those who start at the crack of dawn cannot be blamed for wanting to get away early, even if it means non-attendance at the presentations. Teams should not be stigmatised for this and tournament programmes should be adaptable enough to allow for it. At Sutton Fields what I was trying to achieve was a much more flexible system where people have more choice. As a matter of interest more teams were in favour than those who were not.

I spent sometime thinking about the system and how I was going to achieve it. I decided that to ensure that I was able to find ring parties, clubs with <u>more than one open team</u> should have at least one of their teams competing morning AND another in the afternoon. Also starter teams were to be in the opposite half to their open counterparts. Because I didn't receive the seed times until the day I was to photocopy and send out the programme my plans went slightly wrong. My rough allocation to divisions was not quite right and I had to switch one or two teams around. Unfortunately in the rush to get everything out on time I overlooked that fact that one or two clubs had now got all their races either morning or afternoon. If I had recognised this and been able to make the necessary changes may be it would have proved universally acceptable – but as Howard says "no matter what you do you can never please everybody all of the time". I still believe that organised properly it is a viable alternative for a 4 division day.

To conclude, we all know that tournaments are quite relaxed occasions and there is nothing wrong with that. BUT here are some thoughts on how tournaments could be more 'user friendly':- Flexible registration/dog measuring times, to start ON TIME, more (and shorter) presentations in the day. Separate ring provided (as the norm) for fun events.

I hope this has given people some food for thought. May be as a result we shall see more innovative ideas coming forward which can only be good for flyball in the long run.

#### TOUR NAMENT FOR MATS

I know I must sound biased as a team captain and club secretary for Anne Alcock's Live Wire Teams but a new format for a tournament, I feel is long overdue at some venues.

Like many other competitors, we have family commitments which can't be ignored, even for the duration of a tournament. Since my son Owen was born I've been involved in every competition we have entered for as a club, however it has been incredibly hard work due to childcare issues.

It's hard to leave a baby/toddler with your partner from 6am 'till 8pm, when you know that you'll be welcomed home by a person who is about to pull his hair out with lack of sleep and constant baby monitoring! (He finishes work at 10.30pm and has to get up at 5.00am due to Owen being an early bird)!

However, with many attempts, we have tried to use flyball as a family day out. But, as you can guess, due to the long hours and typical U.K. weather, how do you keep a young child entertained in the confinement of a small car, all day?? #### CHAIRMAN'S FOOD FOR THOUGHT.

I would like members to consider how we can overcome problems with the break out rule and submitted times.

It should be remembered that the rule is intended to prevent a team deliberately re positioning themselves in a lower division so that they can win it. It may be worth reminding every body that when a submitted time is given to the tournament organiser it should be in writing and a reason given.

The rule (5.18m) is that if a submitted time is used by a team they will "break out" and loose the heat if they run more than one second faster than the fastest SEEDED time in the division.

#### SO WHAT IF;

Team A submits a time of ....19.80

Team B submits a time of .... 20.20

Team C submits a time of .... 20.50

Team D are Seeded at ......20.80

Team E are seeded at ......... 20.85

Therefore the Breakout time for the Division is ONE second faster than team Ds seed time. i.e. 19.80

Now if team A run at 19.79 they will break out and loose the heat, hardly fair as they submitted a time of 19.80 More than 3 breakouts and the team lose everything.

One of the reasons that a team may have to submit a time is the fact that after 4 months the seed time is removed from the list because it is Null & Void (rule 4.5)

As tournament organisers we sometimes refer to the Team Stats and use the last recorded time, usually having asked the team. This enables us to position the team within the divisions. This time then is strictly speaking declared, but as organisers we do not enter a break out on that teams racing sheet. We need this to be regularised.

If you think that the above sonario doesn't happen I could refer you to a race at the end of last summer. One of the Northern Bytes teams was competing against one of the PODS teams - both broke out, so the race became a matter of trying to go a tiny bit faster than the other team, but not break out -A farce!

In the judging Procedures 5.7 section vii of the rules, it refers to seed/submitted time, thus suggesting that a submitted time for the fastest team in the division can be used.

The reason that the problems highlighted here have not caused much trouble is because as tournament organisers we have used discretion in applying the break out. A proposal to sort out the situation will be put before the AGM, but please think about this and consider a few what ifs.




