FROM THE EDITOR.....

THE B.F.A. RESPONSE

In June this year, the association became aware of a letter being circulated by The Kennel Club to all teams that had taken part in the Crufts competition in January. In short, it was asking for constructive views on flyball generally, but specifically noting that neither the box or tennis balls, were to be part of that discussion. Some of you are probably aware that back last summer at Hemel Hempstead half way through the Crufts qualifying competition, a representative of The Kennel Club, prior to the round starting, stated to all those teams present, that they could continue to qualify on boxes that conformed to The Kennel Club guidelines, but would not be allowed to use them at the finals. Boxes would be supplied.

It was unclear then exactly what box they had in mind.

A little later on, a former member of the association along with Premier Jumps submitted a design along the lines of what he thought was required. The paramount importance being the safety of the dog, the design was not taken up.

Approximately six weeks prior to the finals, some qualifiers started to receive the chosen design. This style of box would now appear to be The Kennel Club standard for their flyball competitions. For those of you who have not had a chance to see one, the outline is similar to this.



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It is well padded over the top surface, and has to be, the flight of the ball is high, in attempting to catch it, the dog does have a tendency to fall back onto it. I have seen some dogs perform very well on it, but it does not suit the faster ones. The decision on its safety lies with the owner, and what's best for his/her dog.

Personally, I have no axe to grind about The Kennel Clubs choice as an individual, exercising the criteria above, and having experienced flyball from its very first in this country. My preference is for no pedal, and a flat front. After three years, of what appears to me to have been confusion and indecision over the sport, I was only too pleased to join a group who were both, progressives and responsive to the needs of the sport, backed with the knowledge of the North Americans, who have a decade of experience in International flyball.

However! The kennel club letter has some worrying implications for those involved in international flyball.

My interpretation of it is, in short, if we don't play it their way, we will not be allowed to do it at any licensed Kennel Club show. We may also face the big Eee!? if we continue doing our own thing. As individuals, there is the likelihood that we may be prohibited from all other Kennel Club activities be it, agility/obedience/trials or show. I hope I am wrong.

I sincerely hope I have misinterpreted the letter, but am fully aware of what has taken place since its introduction. All I would like to see, is a level playing field, there is room for both types of flyball, both entertaining and skilful and at the end of the day flyballers will make up their own minds.

I hasten to add, that this is my own personnel view, but I would dearly like to hear yours.

Our Chairman has replied to the letter on the associations behalf, with the committees approval, a copy of which is included.

Letter from the Chairman to The K.C.

Dear Mrs Symns

It has come to our attention that the Kennel Club has issued its own Draft Regulations for Flyball. Since we were not contacted directly, we will refrain from any comments or suggestions regarding the same.

However, it is obvious from examination of the Regulations that Kennel Club Flyball will continue to be run along the lines of the Crufts Competition seen earlier this year.

As you are aware the British Flyball Association is committed solely to further the sport of International Flyball as instigated by N.A.F.A. (The North American Flyball Association). A copy of our Rules and Regulations has already been sent to you, and these vary considerably from your own Draft Regulations.

Flyball originated in North America where it has grown under N.A.F.A. into one of the major dog sports. Their rules have also evolved over many years to a point where they now are truly the basis for "International Flyball".

It is a statement of fact that when the Kennel Club Draft Regulations become applicable to Flyball held at licensed events there will be two distinct types of Flyball available to competitors in this Country.

One will be the Kennel Club "Crufts" type Flyball that will be unique to this country and designed primarily as a spectator sport. The other will be International Flyball Racing, which is the exciting speed event that many people in the BFA have become as addicted too as our friends have in North America and other parts of the World.

As stated in our previous correspondence the safety and well being of dogs competing at BFA sanctioned events is of paramount importance. The

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Canadians have many dogs who have been racing continuously all their adult lives (for up to 10 years), without any associated long term problems. Their expertise gained over these many years has helped us not only with equipment design, but also in training for speed with safety.

Many people associated with BFA Flyball Racing have considerable involvement with The Kennel Club through other activities, and indeed many of their dogs will be registered with The Kennel Club for Show, Obedience, Agility and Working Trials. Their commitment to dogs and the dog world is without question and includes participating in and indeed judging at licensed Kennel Club Events at all levels including Crufts. If, as is almost certainly the case, they wish to continue to enjoy Flyball by competing at our BFA Events will you please give us the assurance that they or their dogs will not have their good standing with the Kennel Club in any way jeopardised.

It is not our Intention to be directly or indirectly confrontational regarding this matter and indeed we fully support The Kennel Club in many of its activities, and we will continue to hold your requirements regarding safety and welfare of our dogs as a minimum standard of our sport. We, however, at the end or the day remain fully committed to International Flyball Racing run the North American way.

May we finally say that the only real problem we can see with the two distinctive types of activity being available to people, which are both called Flyball, is that they may not appreciate the safety problems associated with switching from one type of box to the other. This in our opinion can only have disastrous effects If a dog trained for speed were to encounter a "Crufts" type box without retraining, if indeed retraining is possible for some dogs.

We would only be too pleased to discuss this problem or Indeed any other matter regarding Flyball with anyone from The Kennel Club. Our invitation to come and see our type of event at any time remains open. Please contact the writer if any further information is required.

THE ROYAL WELSH SHOW - JULY 1994

The Royal Welsh Show is one of the largest, if not the largest Agricultural show in Britain. This truly represents the farmers of the country, with huge displays of tractors, combine harvesters, muck spreaders, and all the bits that go with it. (You can tell I'm not from farming stock), its got bulls, heifers calves, beef and dairy cattle, all bathed up, toe nails polished and tails swishing merrily away. And how you go to Wales and not mention sheep, there be hundreds of e'm. Plus shearing competitions (a little unfair I think) it only takes a few minutes for a sheep to lose its coat, its ten times larger than a poodle, and that takes two hours to turn out in a lamb cut.

A lot of rare breeds were represented including varieties of goats, chickens, llamas, camels and donkeys (I will come back to the donkeys later).

Aside from all that, there was a Fur and Feather Pavilion, Axe Racing, Pole Climbing, J.C.B. Ballet, and a Mast Manning display team, (I certainly would not like to be the "button boy"! - (ask a sailor - or Hayley)!

As a Staffie owner, I have rubbed shoulders many times with the Dangerous Dogs Act 1991. It is indeed, a subject which I could discuss for hours, and frequently do.

While walking with my dog in the street, I have received many snide comments. Both his, and my parentage have been assumed, and I have been subjected to a torrent of violent verbal abuse, which very nearly has turned physical.

I can understand it from those who do not have, or do not like dogs, reacting as they do. But I'm constantly surprised at the amount of dog owners, who have jumped on the anti-Pit Bull bandwagon.

Basically the problem is ignorance, they just don't know the difference between a Pit and a Staff. The press does not help when it talks of the former, but publishes pictures of the latter. I can only beg you, as dog owners, to make yourself familiar with all aspects of this act, and to realise its full implications. All of our dogs could be at risk, not just my Staffie, or Mr Bloggs Pit Bull Terrier.

The act itself is cruel and unjust, it should be drastically amended, or better still repealed.

Who cares enough to speak out for those we hold so dear.

A GREAT DANE

Everyone know of several Flyball Champion Border Collies, Australian Shepherds, Labrador, even Jack Russell Terriers. But how many FDCh Great Danes do you know? Georgia and John Thomas (I know him!) of CDTC Leaps N Bounds know of 2, and they are both theirs.

On 14 May 1994 a five year old fawn bitch named Thavern's Madeira (Maddi) became the second Great Dane to earn an FDCh title. the first Great Dane to earn her Flyball Championship happens to be her cousin Thavern's Serenade which Georgia and John also co-own. Another factor has made Maddi's title even more spectacular is the fact that Maddi only has sight in her left eye. Shortly after Maddi earned her breed championship, Maddi's right eye was lot to glaucoma and had surgery for an intra-ocular prosthesis.

Maddi's first tournament took place in Sept 92 at the

Astohall in Houston. After that she took some time off for surgery and recovery. Maddi then continued racing a total of 9 tournaments until she earned her Flyball Champion title.

Maddi is handled in flyball by student Teresa Nowin.

Maddi has an average time of around 6 seconds, and her best time at a tournament was 5.57 seconds which took place on 29 Jan 94.

JUMP HEIGHTS

Last May, ballots were sent out to delegates concerning a rule change that would make the minimum jump height 6" instead of 8". All votes have been tallied and the final outcome was that the vote didn't pass with the required ²/₃ majority. The minimum jump height will remain at 8". This is the second time this change has been defeated so the likelihood that this change will come up again in the future is very slim.

20.000 POINTS!

On 9th April 1994 at the Maximum Overdrives tournament in Detroit. Michigan, De'Ja became the 3rd dog ever to obtain the converted ONYX award by achieving 20,000 Flyball points. De'Ja, a 6 year old Border Collie, under the training and handling of Charsie Moore of Pawbusters, started racing when she was 1 vear old.

A point of interest, this is the second dog from Pawbusters to win this title and De'Ja is also a housemate of ONYX, the first dog to break the 20,000 point barrier.
